The Phone Team...Here to Take Your Call!

Wild Bird Rehabilitation is open and accepts patients 365 days a year at our Songbird Hospital! Our goal is to provide the best outcome for the bird. This does not always require treatment at WBR and may be resolved closer to home.

Call before you bring in a bird

We ask Rescuers to "call before you bring in a bird". Our Phone Team responds to all phone calls and will help diagnose the issue, provide a recommendation and walk you through any steps including guidelines for transporting the bird to WBR.

When you see a bird in distress it's critical to react - you may be the difference between life and death. Without action on your part the bird may be exposed to predators, pets, weather or starvation.

During Baby Bird Season - primarily Spring and Summerour Phone Team helps you distinguish between a vulnerable hatchling who fell out of the nest and a fledgling who is on the road to independence hopping around on the ground. They talk you through returning the hatchling to the nest or a nest substitute and in the case of the fledgling he is still being cared for by mom and your

mission is to keep him safe from pets.

experienced team members who can help diagnose the issue, identify the bird or provide general support. Taking these phone calls allows those working in the "hospital" to concentrate on bird care. The Phone Team is a critical part of bird rescue and a rewarding contribution to the environment by helping to save the lives of songbirds who are generally in decline and also supporting those who are saving birds and need guidance.

Spring Surprises! During Spring we welcome the sight of birds nesting in our yard

and enjoy watching the parents flying back to the nest with food for the babies. We're not so enamored when we find birds nesting in our front door wreath or occupying the barbeque pit! Sometimes it's even worse when you discover wildlife in your attic or walls. Animals discover shelter in unlikely locations, such as a case where opossums used coat pockets in a retail store and starlings utilized a bathroom vent for warmth and shelter in a commercial building.

Looking for a solution to your wildlife problem?

Humane Wildlife Solutions LLC (www.humanewildlifesolutionsllc.com), founded by Gary Guinn, has operated in the St Louis area for 25 years. They are often called to remedy problems for WBR rescuers when they find birds and other wildlife in undesirable locations. First, they assess the home or business for the animals' access point. Then, they provide a humane option for the

and designate Wild Bird Rehabilitation as your charity. Facebook handles everything!

owner and the animals. When the animals have been evacuated the opening is closed off if possible, resulting in a permanent solution. Always remember there are solutions to these situations that are friendly to both you and the animal.

Birdwatching in St. Louis

One of the many birdwatching hotspots near St. Louis is Creve Coeur Memorial Park. During April and May, songbirds migrating to northern nesting grounds will stop off in such greenspaces to rest and refuel. Some migrants you may see there include the Canada Warbler, Blackburnian Warbler, and Blue-Headed Vireo. Wetlands, like Little Creve Coeur Marsh, host American Bitterns and Prothonotary Warblers. Black-Bellied Whistling Ducks nested here last year, which is a first for St. Louis County!









Within the Busch Greenway in St. Charles, unbroken forests are an important habitat for the Scarlet Tanager, Wood Thrush, and Cerulean Warbler. Scrubby land with native grasses and bushes is another specialized habitat found in this area. It hosts songsters like the Bell's Vireo, Yellow-Breasted Chat, and Orchard Oriole.
